


Whew! The 26th Annual ATAA GMM, Seminars and Clinics are all wrapped up.

Sunday: Karen Ososki demo and clinics



How did you get introduced to the Akhal-Teke?

I have admired Akhal-Teke horses from afar for many years. But in 2019, a wonderful perlino Akhal-Teke stallion appeared in my life. We lived together for three years. He left a big mark on my work. I can not say that the experience of close communication with one representative of the breed can affect the attitude towards the breed. But this period was very positive and my interest and respect for the Akhal-Teke breed grew.

What about the Akhal-Teke inspires you artistically?

I really like the type of Akhal-Teke horse. The lines of their body, amazing plasticity and eastness. I'm interested in horse breeds which vividly reflect the culture and history of their country.

What make the Akhal-Teke unique to you, and how do you capture the breed's distinctive characteristics in your art?

I notice that the Akhal-Teke horse is often drawn as a little bit aggressive, like a snake. On the one hand, I agree with this image. But for me the Akhal-Teke horse is subtlety, tenderness. Many of my work with Akhal-Teke horses is about family and love. My charge Akhal-Teke stallion opens for me the nature of these horses from this side with his gentle character and fragility. For me, they are sensitive, responsive and kind horses.











How would you describe your style?

My style began for many years. Back in school, I used to like drawing small patterns and match them with large shapes. Also topics of fairy tales and myths have always been interested to me, which entailed the study of the ornaments of different countries. The topics of animals has always been my favourite, and gradually it all came together in my work. My style, although found, is changing and developing. I always try something new in technology and materials. I am interested in experimenting. But gold patterns have become my hallmark in any technique..

What do you hope to inspire with your art?

I draw what delights and excites me and I want to share these feelings through my art. I don't really like talking about myself and sharing my feelings. I'm an introvert. But through my art I discover a lot for the viewer. And I want to share the object of my admiration with the outside world.



The start of April 2022 the global Akhal-Teke Community came together to help Ukrainian Akhal Tekes in need. People started connecting worldwide in an attempt to bring aid to the Akhal-Teke and their breeders in war then Ukraine. Collaboration between the Akhal Teke Association of America and the Akhal Teke Foundation started raising funds to be able to help. Collaboration with individuals for organizations and delegation of funds, mobilization of supplies, and offers of refuge for horses In Europe resulted in successfully evacuating horses and bring aid in the way for much needed hay and grain to the horses left behind. March 25th 2022. The first Ukrainian akhal tekes are scheduled to leave the country within a few days, but as of this morning are still in quarantine in Ukraine. The difficult and expensive evacuation has been made possible largely from donations made to the Akhal-

April 18,2022. Positive update on the efforts to help the Akhal Tekes in Ukraine! Thanks to all the generous donations, we have been able to evacuate two mares. Their breeder traveled along with them to their new temporary home in the EU, and then turned around and went back into Ukraine to look after her other horses there. The most intense fighting in the area of her broodmares has subsided somewhat (though no area in Ukraine is safe), allowing an assessment of the situation. Large amounts of military debris were collected from the pastures and clear signs of artillery strikes could be seen. The video shows the

road driving to the mares pastures. There are still four horses that she hopes to get out of Ukraine: two broodmares who have already arranged stabling for, plus a 3 year old stallion and a yearling colt, both of whom will be for sale once they are safely out of Ukraine. The sales of those two should help provide funds for the remaining horses. Inquiries are welcome.

June 8, 2022. Thanks to your generosity, this Akhal-Teke yearling in Ukraine has been moved out of the area where he endured weeks of daily bombardements around his paddock, and he can now safely relax in his own personal stall and receive proper nutrition in anticipation of his further journey to safety in the EU.

Continuing Research on the Teke Glide

In 2014 the Gaited Locomotive Research Program (GLRP) at Mississippi State University working with the Livestock Conservancy conducted the first study on the unique trotting gait of the Akhal-Teke breed that is often referred to as the "Teke Glide". The research found that the Akhal-Teke at slower trotting velocities performed a symmetrical, 4-beat stepping gait with coupling, rather than pairing, of the diagonal limbs. The unique stepping nature of the gait and the dissociation of the diagonal limb pairs created a gait similar to the fox trot of the Missouri Fox Trotter allowing for a comfortable ride, thus, the name "Teke Glide". However, the lack of suspension during the stride cycle made for an inefficient gait that would lead to early fatigue. Knowing that the Akhal-Teke excels as endurance horses, the researchers at GLRP continued their work with the Livestock Conservancy collecting numerous video clips of Akhal-Teke horses performing various trotting velocities. This summer the finalized research on the impact of velocity on the trotting gait of the Akhal-Teke was presented at the American Society of Animal Science (ASAS) Symposium in Oklahoma City. GLRP researchers found that at faster velocities the Akhal-Teke can produce a true trotting gait with suspension and diagonal limb pairing allowing for a more efficient gait for longer endurance rides. This ability to have an additional "gear" within the velocity range of the typical trot is similar to what is seen in the Icelandic horse breed. Akhal-Teke riders have the opportunity to enjoy the smoothness of the "Teke Glide" or can select for a more efficient ground- covering movement of the typical trot when participating in an endurance ride.

As to what's next for the GLRP, along with their collaborative work with the Livestock Conservancy, researchers also dedicate time towards educating the horse community about the work they are doing. This outreach program includes working with the Mississippi 4-H Horse Club educating youth involved in the horse judging program about various types of gaits found in more unique breeds like the Akhal-Teke. Through these educational youth programs, the GLRP researchers began a high school research internship for Mississippi youth. The first youth interning with the GLRP is Grace Christian School senior Julius Culwell from Louisville, Mississippi. He assisted this summer with the Mississippi State University poster presentations at the ASAS Symposium along with working on a grant proposal for funding his upcoming gait research. Julius submitted his grant proposal to the Livestock Conservancy Youth Microgrant Program. His grant proposal is focused on a comparative study looking at other similar stepping gaits as the Akhal-Teke with his research tentatively scheduled to begin this fall. If funded, Julius is hoping to complete his work by the end of his senior year so that he can present his research at the upcoming Equine Science Society Symposium in Fort Worth in June. Individuals can refer to the Livestock Conservancy website for further details concerning the collaborative gait research being done between the GLRP and the Livestock Conservancy.

Lights, Cameras... Tekes?

Ever since I was a little girl I understood the power of cinema. It's ability to capture, evoke, empower, and inspire; it's ability to connect us with the intangible and the unimaginable. One of the most formative films to my lifelong passion for horses was The Black Stallion, a Walter Farley best-selling novel turned film that grossed nearly 40M and has captured imaginations worldwide since its release in 1979. Its following has even supported a successful sequel, prequel, and TV series. What is most memorable about it, however, is the horse.

The director of The Black Stallion, Carroll Ballard, understood how to capture the spirit of the horse and essence of why this particular horse was so special. His creative visuals, and cinematic embrace of the black stallion as an equal hero in the story, invited viewers on an enchanting and emotional journey–leaving many to dream of the horse for years to come.

Many other horse movies around the world have similarly portrayed a horse as a hero in their stories. Black Beauty, Flicka, War Horse, Secretariat... Movies like these capture horses in a way that makes us remember and treasure them. They fuel our imagination, and even spark desires to meet or own horses that remind us of the equine hero onscreen.

The Black Stallion film hugely promoted the Arabian horse breed. Until I met Akhal-Tekes, my first horse was set to be an Arabian, believing I could live some of the movie magic. The film Ladyhawke was likewise a major promotion for the Friesian horse, inspiring people to buy their own in order to live out part of the fantasy. Hidalgo did the same for the American Mustang and the story of Misty brought attention to the wild Chincoteague Pony. But what about a film to promote the Akhal-Teke?

The Akhal-Teke played a pivotal role in human history, with countless tales of equine heroism, and its story has waited over 3,000 year-old to be told on the big screen. Their intelligence, grace, heart, and gleam deserves to be captured in HD for the world to see.

This past May, I was serendipitously introduced to someone who could give Tekes that opportunity to shine on the silver screen!

Todd Piece, a film producer who has adopted a great appreciation of the Akhal-Teke breed and its long history alongside some of the greatest empires that ever existed, has decided to make Akhal-Tekes a centerpiece of his studios' new direction. Todd and his internationally-talented team, have already written scripts for two feature length films featuring Akhal-Teke horses and are nearing completion on the plans for a live-action, historical drama series. In two of these productions, the Akhal-Teke will stand as a hero in the story, but in all productions the studios' goal will be to promote and bring more exposure to this ancient, endangered breed.




